What Chaplains do

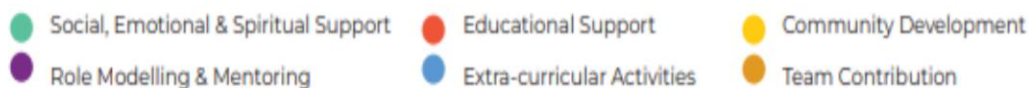

School chaplains in Australia provide social, emotional, and spiritual support to school communities. They contribute to the overall wellbeing strategies and educational goals of our local schools.

School chaplains promote positive spirituality. They provide opportunities for students, staff and families to explore their own spirituality and what it means to them.

How to get access to chaplaincy services at our school

School chaplaincy services are available and accessible to all students, staff and families, but they are particularly invested in supporting individuals and groups who may be considered at-risk. Through early intervention activities and pastoral support, school chaplains increase the chances of these young people experiencing better life outcomes. At Mount Isa School of the Air, school chaplaincy services are accessible through parent, teacher- or self-referrals as well as programs that will be available throughout the year.

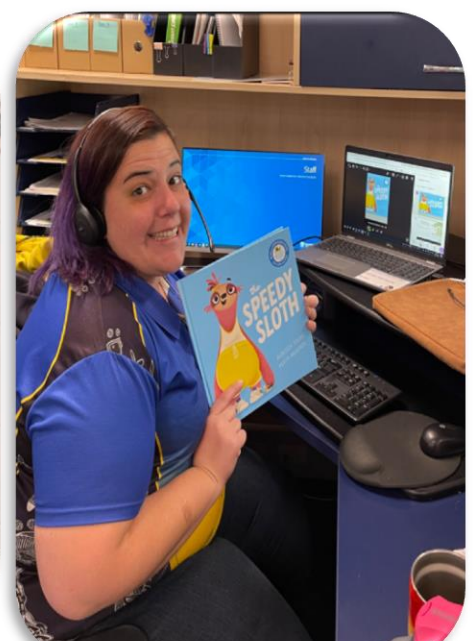

National Simultaneous Storytime (NSS) is held annually by the Australian Library and Information Association (ALIA). Every year a picture book, written and illustrated by an Australian author and illustrator, is read simultaneously in libraries, schools, pre-schools, childcare centres, family homes, bookshops and many other places around the country. Now in its 23rd successful year, it is a colourful, vibrant, fun event that aims to promote the value of reading and literacy, using an Australian children's book that explores age-appropriate themes, and addresses key learning areas of the National Curriculum for Foundation to Year 6. This year there was 2,357,960 registered participants, from over 22,542 locations! Wow, what a fantastic turnout!

I cannot believe that half a year has passed and we have already had so many exciting opportunities to get together face-to-face and learn alongside one another. With Mini Schools now upon us, I am looking forward to hearing about all of the inspiring learning opportunities that occur for our students as we focus on what is 'Beyond the Station Gate.'

Last term I had the opportunity to meet with some of you during Home Tutor Week. It was great to have conversations with a variety of Home Tutors and Govies about the obstacles you are facing in your isolated classrooms. At these sessions, I was able to suggest a few ways you can use differentiation to support the needs of your learners. Working in a multi-age classroom is not a walk in the park and I take my hats off to you all!

To recap, we looked at the four ways that we can differentiate through content, product, process and environment. Some of the takeaways were that not all students learn in the same way and that through the building of relationships and getting to know our learners' preferred learning style, we can guide our learners through the content in a way that makes sense to them.

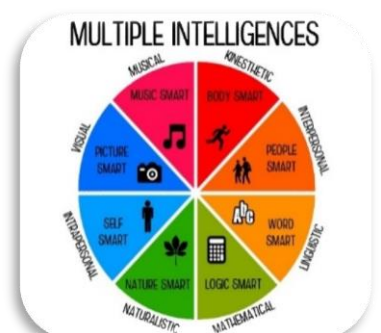
Over the past few terms, I have been working alongside our teachers to assist them in planning for our diverse learners' needs. Some weeks this looks like having conversations around individual student need and where to next and at other times looking at reasonable adjustments that could be made to cater for a wide range of abilities in whole classroom situations.

With the introduction of the coach role, it has enabled a renewed focus on Quality Teaching and to have the time to reflect on what we can do to ensure that Every Student is Succeeding. As a

teaching staff, we have been able to have conversations around what are the barriers to student engagement and plan for the support that is required students and staff alike.

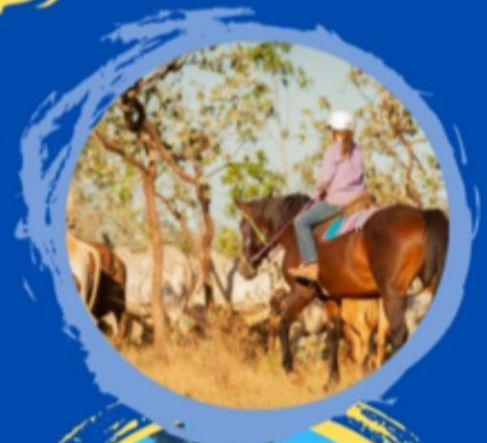
2024 BUSH KIDS CALENDAR
